

India's first Biennale

Fort Kochi, also known as Cochin, is a beautiful, bustling port town in the southern Indian state of Kerala.

From the fourteenth century, Kochi was an important spice trading centre, and from the sixteenth century was occupied successively by the Portuguese, the Dutch and the British. In 2012, Kochi became home to India's very first contemporary art biennale, the Kochi-Muziris Biennale.

The second Kochi-Muziris Biennale draws strongly on the rich history of Kochi, both as an important port in the spice trade and as the site of the site of the Kerala School of Astronomy and Mathematics from the fourteenth to the sixteeth century. We travel to the south of India to explore the second Kochi-Muziris Biennale, which features the work of Yoko Ono, Wim Delvoye, Anish Kapoor and William Kentridge, with the Artistic Director Jitish Kallat as our guide.
